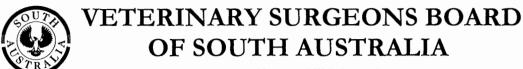

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PRESIDING MEMBER'S REPORT

I was appointed Presiding Member of the Veterinary Surgeons Board of South Australia on 1 January 2015.

My predecessor's appointment ended on 30 September 2014.

Under section 12 of the *Veterinary Practice Act 2003*, the Board's responsibility is to protect "animal health, safety and welfare and the public interest by achieving and maintaining high professional standard both of competence and conduct in the provision of veterinary treatment in this State."

This responsibility is reflected in the Board functions prescribed by section 13 of the Act.

The Board has limited resources to perform its statutory functions.

The Board's funding is principally derived from annual practice fees charged to veterinary surgeons, a relatively small profession in this State.

The Board has to carefully manage its limited resources in order to discharge its responsibilities and perform its statutory functions.

The Board continues to receive an increasing number of complaints against veterinary surgeons. On a per capita basis, it has the highest complaint rate in Australia.

Prior to my appointment, Ernst & Young had conducted a review of the Board, following concerns of the Government about its performance and financial sustainability.

Two recent appeal decisions of the District Court of South Australia provided guidance to the Board for the conduct of future disciplinary hearings and an opportunity to reflect on its notification handling processes.

Under my guidance and with support from the Registrar, the Board has adopted a number of recommendations of Ernst & Young, developed new policies and processes, conducted member training and implemented a new guideline for the handling of notifications. The review process is ongoing.

A process of review and renewal creates an additional workload for the Board and in particular, the Registrar. I thank members for their commitment to engaging in this process and the Registrar for her dedication and efforts over the past year.

I also acknowledge the support provided by the Hon. Minister Bignell MP, Minister for Agriculture, Food and Fisheries, and the staff of Biosecurity SA.

LEGISLATION AND FUNCTIONS

Establishment and Authority

The Veterinary Surgeons Board of South Australia (the "Board") is established and operates under the provisions of the *Veterinary Practice Act 2003* (the "Act").

Objects

The Board must exercise its functions with the object of protecting animal health, safety and welfare and the public interest by achieving and maintaining high professional standards both of competence and conduct in the provision of veterinary treatment in this State.

Ministerial Responsibility

The Act is within the portfolio of the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Fisheries, the Honourable Minister Bignell MP.

Amendments to the Act

Amendments to the Act came into operation on 1 January 2015.

The principal amendment introduced national recognition of veterinary registration in this State.

As a result of this amendment, veterinary surgeons registered in interstate jurisdictions are able to practise in this State under the deemed registration provisions in Part 3, Division 3 of the Act.

Part 2, Division 2 of the Act was also amended to change the composition of the Board by increasing the number of members.

As a result of this amendment, one member of the Board must be a veterinary surgeon engaged in teaching veterinary science nominated by the Council of The University of Adelaide.

Functions

Pursuant to section 13 of the Act, the functions of the Board are as follows:

- to recognise courses of education or training that provide qualifications for registration on the general register or the specialist register;
- (b) to determine the requirements necessary for registration on the general register or the specialist register;
- (c) to determine the specialties in which a person may be registered on the specialist register;
- (d) to establish and maintain the registers contemplated by the Act:
- (e) to prepare or endorse codes of conduct and professional standards for veterinary surgeons;
- (f) to prepare or endorse guidelines on continuing education for veterinary surgeons;
- (g) to establish administrative processes for handling complaints received against veterinary surgeons or veterinary services providers (which may include processes under which the veterinary surgeon or veterinary services provider voluntarily enters into an undertaking);
- (h) to provide advice to the Minister as may be appropriate; and
- (i) to carry out other functions assigned to the Board by or under the Act.

COMPOSITION OF BOARD

The Board consists of 8 members appointed by the Governor.

The Governor has appointed a person to be a deputy of each member. A deputy so appointed may act as a member of the Board in the absence of the member.

- 1. Mr John Foster Strachan AM, a legal practitioner, was nominated by the Minister and appointed as Presiding Member of the Board, pursuant to section 6(1)(b)(i) of the Act on 1 January 2015. Mr Allan Roy Hunter is appointed as his deputy. The term of Mr Strachan's predecessor, Ms Debra Ruth Lane, and that of her deputy, Mr Paul Douglas Leadbeter, expired on 30 September 2014.
- 2. Prof Kym Anthony Abbott, a veterinary surgeon engaged in teaching veterinary science, was nominated by the Council of The University of Adelaide, and appointed under section 6(1)(c) of the Act on 1 January 2015. Dr Kiro Risto Petrovski is appointed as his deputy.
- 3. Mr David Keith Basham, a community member with experience or knowledge relating to animal health, safety and welfare, was nominated by the Minister and appointed under section 6(1)(b)(iii) of the Act on 2 October 2014. Ms Fiona Elizabeth Fuhlbohm is appointed as his deputy.
- 4. Mrs Wendy Ann Hunt, a community member with experience or knowledge relating to animal health, safety and welfare, was nominated by the Minister, appointed under section 6(1)(b)(iii) of the Act on 1 October 2011 and re-appointed on 2 October 2014. Mr Charles Benjamin Goode is appointed as her deputy.
- 5. Dr Barbara Joy Menzies, a veterinary surgeon, was nominated by the South Australian Division of Australian Veterinary Association, appointed under section 6(1)(a) of the Act on 8 August 2013 and re-appointed on 2 October 2014. Dr Angus Malcolm Brown is appointed as her deputy. Dr Brown's appointment took effect on 2 October 2014 following expiry of the term of his predecessor, Dr Andrew Wallace Carter on 30 September 2014.
- 6. Dr Robert Seymour Rahaley, a veterinary surgeon, was nominated by the Minister, appointed under section 6(1)(b)(ii) of the Act on 1 March 2010 and re-appointed on 7 March 2013. Dr Celia-Jane Dickason is appointed as his deputy.
- 7. Dr James Andrew Smith, a veterinary surgeon with experience or knowledge relating to animals used for primary production or horses, was nominated by the Minister, appointed under section 6(1)(b)(ii)(A) of the Act on 1 January 2010 and re-appointed on 1 January 2013. Dr Elizabeth Jean Aikenhead is appointed as his deputy.
- 8. The member position for a veterinary surgeon with experience or knowledge relating to animals other than those used for primary production or horses under section 6(1)(b)(ii)(B) of the Act, was vacant as at 30 June 2015. Dr Hayley Joy McPhee held the appointment until 30 September 2014 at which time she resigned her membership of the Board due to an interstate relocation. The term of her deputy, Dr Karen Anne Hunter also ended at that time.

THE REGISTRAR

Ms Carol Irvine was appointed Registrar of the Board on 10 February 2014 pursuant to section 10 of the Act.

As Chief Executive of the statutory authority, the Registrar is responsible for the Board's operations, for discharging various powers and responsibilities under the Act and for providing information to the Board to enable it to fulfil its governance responsibilities.

Board's Committees

The Board currently has one committee, the Notifications (formerly Complaints) Committee, which met on a total of **10** occasions during 2014/15.

The Board dissolved, by resolution on 6 November 2014, its Audit and Risk Committees (which met on 1 occasion), its Human Resources Committee (which met on 3 occasions), and its Premises, Information Technology and Education Committees (which did not hold any meetings during 2014/15).

APPEAL DECISIONS

An appeal lies to the District Court of South Australia against decisions made by the Board.

The following judgments of the District Court were published by the Courts Administration Authority of South Australia during 2014/15 in relation to appeals against decisions made by the Board in disciplinary proceedings under the Act:

- Judgment of His Honour Judge Tilmouth dated 2 December 2014 in the matter of Lehmann v Registrar, an appeal against a
 decision made by the Board on 6 November 2013; and
- Reasons for the Decision of His Honour Judge Cuthbertson dated 6 February 2015 in the matter of Sutherland v Minister, an appeal against a decision made by the Board on 25 February 2014.

ACCREDITATION AND RECOGNITION OF TRAINING

In Australia and New Zealand, the Australasian Veterinary Boards Council Inc. ("AVBC") undertakes the visitation and assessment of veterinary schools and makes recommendations to the Board.

AVBC is an incorporated association by agreement of the State and Territory Veterinary Boards of Australia and the Veterinary Council of New Zealand.

The Veterinary Schools Accreditation Advisory Committee, a standing committee of the AVBC, manages the accreditation process.

Joint accreditation visits are undertaken by the AVBC and the Council of Education of the American Veterinary Medical Association and the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons. The European Association of Establishment for Veterinary Education and South African Veterinary Council may also be invited to act as observers.

The AVBC website lists the veterinary qualifications, which the Board accepts as providing eligibility to apply for registration without further examination as a veterinary practitioner in Australia and New Zealand.

The Board received, considered and adopted the following recommendations of AVBC during 2014/15:

Massey University

That the Massey University veterinary science course be accredited until the next scheduled visit in 2021, subject to the receipt of satisfactory annual reports.

University College of Dublin

That graduates of the University College of Dublin be accepted for registration without further examination by veterinary boards in all Australian States and Territories and by the Veterinary Council of New Zealand.

Vet Agro Sup Compus Veterinaire de Lyon

That graduates holding the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree from the University of Lyon be accepted for registration by Veterinary Boards in all Australian States and Territories and by the Veterinary Council of New Zealand.

REGISTERS

General Register

As at 30 June 2015, there were 697 primary registrants on the general register.

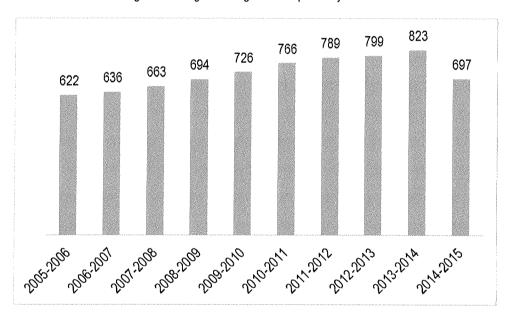
56% of primary registrants were female and 44% of primary registrants were male.

Register of Removed Veterinary Surgeons

As at 30 June 2015, there were **187** registrants on the register of removed veterinary surgeons. Of that number:

- 19 primary registrants had their registration on the general register cancelled due to failure to lodge the 2014 annual return and/or pay the annual practice fee;
- 36 primary registrants were voluntarily removed from the general register due to interstate or overseas relocation; and
- 132 secondary registrants were removed from the general register due to legislative change arising from the deemed registration provisions of the Act which took effect on 1 January 2015.

Specialist Register

As at 30 June 2015, 15 primary registrants on the general register were also registered on the specialist register.

REGISTRATIONS

During 2014/15, a total of **82** registrants were granted registration by the Board including **5** applicants who were granted limited registration.

PRESCRIBED BUSINESS INTERESTS

Section 47 of the Act requires veterinary surgeons (or a prescribed relative of a veterinary surgeon) who has an interest in a prescribed business to provide the Board with prescribed information relating to the interest and the manner in which it arose.

Veterinary surgeons are also required to declare their financial interests in these products or services to the Board.

The Board's record of information provided to it under section 47 of the Act is available for inspection or provision by electronic means.

VETERINARY SERVICES PROVIDERS

A veterinary services provider is defined by section 3 of the Act to mean "a person (not being a veterinary surgeon) who provides veterinary treatment through the instrumentality a veterinary surgeon."

In accordance with sections 50 of the Act, veterinary services providers must provide the Board with prescribed information.

As at 30 June 2015, 42 veterinary services providers were listed by the Board.

The Board's record of information provided to it under section 50 of the Act is available for inspection or provision by electronic means.

VETERINARY HOSPITALS

Section 53 of the Act enables the Board to accredit veterinary hospitals.

Veterinary hospitals are required to meet certain requirements determined by the Board to be necessary for accreditation.

The Board requires an applicant for accreditation or renewal of accreditation to facilitate inspection of the facility by a person authorised by the Board.

The Board has authorised Drs John Leonard Hamilton and Jennifer Anne Weston to inspect facilities of applicants for accreditation or renewal of accreditation.

As at 30 June 2015, 21 facilities were accredited by the Board as veterinary hospitals.

The Board's record of facilities accredited as veterinary hospitals is available for inspection or provision by electronic means.

ORGANISATIONAL INTERACTION

- In August 2014, the former Presiding Member and the Registrar attended a function of the South Australian Division of the Australian Veterinary Association (AVA) in August 2014. The former Presiding Member presented a seminar on the functions and processes of the Board. The Registrar interacted with and took enquiries from members of the profession throughout the event.
- In October 2014, the Registrar met with the Executive Officer of the South Australian Division of the AVA to discuss matters of mutual interest.
- In November 2014, the Registrar presented a lecture to final year Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) students of The
 University of Adelaide in the course of Transition to the Profession on the Board's complaints handling function and
 registration requirements.
- In January 2015, the Registrar met with the Executive Officer of the South Australian Division of the AVA to discuss matters of mutual interest.
- In March 2015, the Registrar presented a lecture and interactive workshop to first year DVM students of The University of Adelaide in the course of *Professional Skills* on the legal obligations of veterinary surgeons.
- In April 2015, the Presiding Member and the Registrar facilitated a veterinary ethical dilemmas workshop for first year DVM students of The University of Adelaide.
- In April 2015, the Presiding Member and the Registrar met with Prof. Hein, Head of School of Animal and Veterinary Sciences, The University of Adelaide.
- In May 2015, Dr Robert Rahaley and the Registrar attended the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the AVBC in Brisbane.
- In May 2015, immediately prior to the AGM of the AVBC, the Registrar attended a meeting of Australian and New Zealand Veterinary Board Registrars in Brisbane.
- During the course of the 2014/15 year, Dr Robert Rahaley attended a number of meetings of AVBC by tele-conference as the Board's representative on AVBC.

WEBSITE

The Board has a website at: www.vsbsa.org.au.

The website has a 'latest news' section which provides information to veterinary surgeons and members of the public.

Codes, standards, guideline, forms and information are available to the public and veterinary surgeons from the website.

The website is under review and is planned to be updated it in 2016/17.

NOTIFICATIONS

One of the functions of the Board is to establish administrative processes for handling complaints against veterinary surgeons or veterinary service providers, which may include processes under which the veterinary surgeon or veterinary services provider voluntarily enters into an undertaking.

The Board established a Complaints Committee under section 15(1) of the Act on 4 March 2010.

By resolution of the Board dated 18 June 2015, the Board changed the name of the Complaints Committee to the Notifications Committee and established detailed terms of reference for the committee.

On 18 June 2015, the Board adopted the following administrative processes:

- 1. Administrative Guidelines for the handling of notifications; and
- 2. Administrative Guidelines for the informal resolution of notifications.

The Registrar gives initial consideration to notifications (formerly referred to as complaints) in conjunction with the Notifications Committee, membership of which is determined on a quarterly basis by the Presiding Member and includes at least two members or deputy members.

The Registrar decides, after taking advice from the Notifications Committee, whether or not to institute disciplinary action by laying a complaint before the Board.

If the Registrar determines that the matter is suitable for informal resolution, the notification will be dealt with by the Registrar informally, in which case the Registrar may attempt to resolve the matter through methods such as a letter of warning or the provision of voluntary undertakings by the veterinary surgeon.

A panel of the Board conducts a disciplinary inquiry if a complaint is laid before it by the Registrar alleging that there is proper cause for disciplinary action against a respondent. The panel acts similarly to a court in conducting the inquiry and makes the ultimate decision as to whether or not proper cause exists, and whether a sanction should be imposed on the respondent.

In May 2015, members and deputy members attended a full day training session on the conduct of disciplinary proceedings. This training was provided by staff of the Crown Solicitor's Office.

On 18 June 2015, the Board adopted Guidelines for Board Members in Proceedings.

If a notification matter is relates to the medical fitness of a veterinary surgeon, the Registrar, in conjunction with the Notifications Committee, will arrange for an investigation to occur in order to ensure that the Board members remain impartial should they need to adjudicate upon the eventual inquiry.

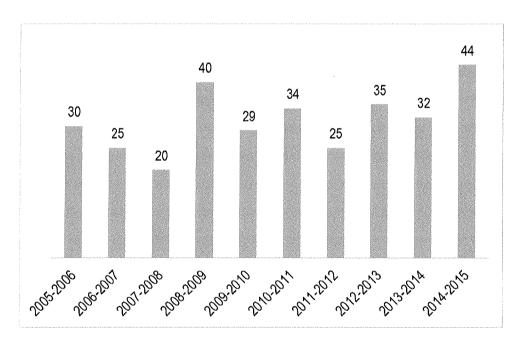
The Notifications Committee also considers notifications concerning the possible commission of offences against the Act. The committee may make a recommendation to the Board as to whether the Board should authorise the Registrar to lay a criminal complaint against a defendant in the Magistrates Court of South Australia.

SUMMARY OF NOTIFICATIONS

44 notifications were received by the Board during 2014/15, which represents an **increase of 37.5**% from the number received during the preceding year.

- 5 notifications were referred to the Crown Solicitor for advice including 1 relating to a medical fitness matter and 1 relating to the possible commission of an offence under the Act
- 4 notifications were investigated by an inspector appointed by the Board under section 56 of the Act
- 2 notifications resulted in the Registrar laying a complaint before the Board
- 1 notification resulted in the veterinary surgeon providing a voluntary undertaking to the Board
- 2 notifications resulted in the Registrar providing a written warning to the veterinary surgeons
- 11 notifications resulted in recommendations being made to veterinary surgeons
- 4 notifications resulted in no action being taken against veterinary surgeons
- 15 notifications remained subject to investigation through the Board's administrative processes

GRAPH 1: Number of notifications received by the Board over the past 10 years.



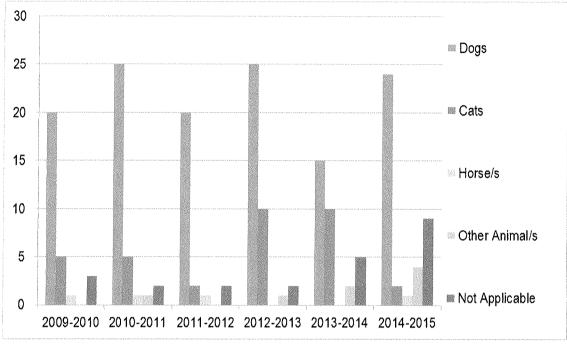
NOTIFICATIONS STATISTICS

Animals

24 notifications related to veterinary treatment provided to dogs, 2 related to cats, 1 related to guinea pigs, 1 related to a bird, 1 related to a horse and 2 related to livestock (cattle and alpacas).

Dogs have consistently the subject of the majority of notifications to the Board over the last 5 years.

INFORMATION ON CLAIMS AGAINST VETERINARY SURGEONS

Section 45 of the Act requires a veterinary surgeon to provide to the Board prescribed information relating to claims of damages or other compensation for alleged negligence committed by the veterinary surgeon in the course of providing veterinary treatment.

The veterinary surgeon must provide the information:

- within 30 days after the claim is made; and
- within 30 days after any order is made by a court to pay damages or other compensation in respect of that claim or any agreement has been entered into for payment of a sum of money in settlement of that claim, whether with or without a denial of liability.

6 veterinary surgeons provided prescribed information to the Board relating to a claim of damages or other compensation for alleged negligence.

• In 3 of these cases, the veterinary surgeon did not comply with the requirement to provide the information within 30 days after the claim was made.

4 veterinary surgeons provided prescribed information to the Board relating to the making of a court order or settlement of a claim.

• In 3 of these cases, the veterinary surgeon did not comply with the requirement to provide the information within 30 days of the making of a court order or entry into a settlement agreement.

ADMINISTRATION

1. Gender Balance

At least one of the members of the Board nominated by the Minister must be a woman and at least one must be a man.

As at 30 June 2015, the Board had 9 male members and 5 female members (including deputy members).

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2015

NOTE 1 - ESTABLISHMENT OF THE BOARD AND FUNDING

The Veterinary Surgeons Board (the Board) was established under the Veterinary Practice Act 2003 (which rep laced the Veterinary Surgeons Act 1985) to provide for registration of veterinary surgeons and to regulate the practace of veterinary surgeons for the purpose of maintaining high standards of competence and conduct by veter inary surgeons in South Australia.

Funding of the Board is primarily from registration fees.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Australian Accounting Interpretations. Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) has concluded would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. The Board has adopted all of the new, revised or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the AASB that are mandatory for the current reporting period. Any new, revised or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The Board is a not-for-profit entity, being an entity whose principal activity is not the generation of profit. As a result, the Board is exempt from applying the following AASBs:

- AASB 114 Segment Reporting
- AASB 120 Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

(a) Income Tax

The Board is specifically exempt from income tax obligations under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 and therefore there are no resultant income tax entries in the accounts.

(b) Cash & Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2015

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont.)

(c) Property, Plant & Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment are carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Useful lives and residual values are reviewed annually.

Plant & Equipment

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected met cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated on a diminishing balance or straight line basis over the useful lives of the assets to the company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

(d) Financial Instruments

Initial Recognition

Financial instruments are initially measured at cost on trade date, which includes transaction costs, when the related contractual rights or obligations exist. Subsequent to initial recognition these instruments are measured as set out below.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are recorded at fair value. Unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in fair value are taken directly to equity (Financial Assets Reserve).

Impairment

At each reporting date, the Board assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether an impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

(e) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Board reviews the carrying values of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2015

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont.)

(f) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Board's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by the employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

(g) Provisions

A provision is recognised in the balance sheet when the company has a present, legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation.

(h) Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Distributions are recognised when the right to receive the distribution has been established.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(i) Goods & Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(j) Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE VETERINARY SURGEONS BOARD OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2015

Report on the Financial Report

I have audited the accompanying financial report of the Veterinary Surgeons Board of South Australia, which comprises the Statement of Financial Position as at 30 June 2015, the Statement of Comprehensive Income, Statement of Changes in Equity and Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information and the Certification of the Financial Report.

The Responsibility of the Board of Management for the Financial Report

The members of the Board of the Veterinary Surgeons Board of South Australia are responsible for the preparation of the financial report in accordance with the Treasurer's Instructions promulgated under the Provisions of the Public Finance and Audit Act 1987, the Veterinary Practice Act 2003, applicable Accounting Standards and Australian Accounting Interpretations. The Board's responsibility also includes such internal control as the Board determines is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on my audit. I have conducted my audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. These Auditing Standards require that I comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the Board as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

The financial report of the Veterinary Surgeons Board of South Australia is in accordance with the Veterinary Practice Act 2003 including

- i. giving a true and fair view of the entity's financial position as at 30 June 2015 and of its performance for the year ended on that date; and
- ii. complying with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations) and the Veterinary Practice Act 2003.

Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution

Without modifying my opinion, I draw attention to Note 2 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist Veterinary Surgeons Board of South Australia to meet the requirements of the Public Finance and Audit Act 1987 and the Veterinary Practice Act 2003. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

Other Matter

Without modifying my opinion, I draw attention to the Statement of Comprehensive Income disclosure of "Sitting Fees" and Note 15 to the financial report which details payments made to members and former members of the board during the year ended 30 June 2015. Although the amounts disclosed appear fairly stated, it is apparent that some of the payments made during the year ended 30 June 2014 up to 31 August 2015 were not properly approved pursuant to relevant legislation, and accordingly, will need to be repaid to the Veterinary Surgeons Board of South Australia. The financial effect of the recovery which is necessary in respect of the year ended 30 June 2015, the year ended 30 June 2014 and prior financial years, cannot be reliably determined at the date of issuing this report.
